## Maths

## Beth Harris

Term 1 saw a huge, school wide focus on place value in Maths. Place value is the understanding that the place of a digit represents a particular value.

In year 3, not only were the children exploring numbers in their canonical form (following the rules of place value; where when you get more than 9 in a column, you automatically create a new column on the left). We also introduced thinking about numbers non-canonically. Therefore, 25 isn't just 2 tens and 5 ones but also 15 ones and 1 ten or simply 25 ones. This fluidity of thinking about numbers is hoped to help children when we come to calculate with numbers.

In LA 1-9, we decided to explore the different ways that one number could be made and presented this in a wanted poster. The children were super creative and demonstrated a great ability to think of numbers in lots of different forms or "disguises."


## Year 2 Recounts

The Superheroes in LA1-7 have been learning about recounts. We examined news articles to help us understand the features of recounts and what we needed to include in our own. We decided that recounts needed to have titles, an introduction with when, where, who and why, subject specific words, events in time order and a reflection that includes how we felt.

Just like journalists, the children had the opportunity to type up their final copy and were given a deadline to meet to get their recount in the newsletter. Here are two examples that met the deadline.
